#### **Message from the Chair**

Culture Days marked a significant milestone in 2019 as we celebrated the organization's 10th anniversary. When the first Culture Days weekend took place in 2010, few people anticipated that this ad-hoc initiative would become Canada's largest cultural event. Along with affiliated organization *Les Journées de la culture* in Quebec, the two initiatives join forces on one weekend each year to demystify and raise awareness of arts and culture from coast-to-coast-to-coast. As a result, over 60,000 hands-on and participatory events have been presented between the two in the past decade. In a country as vast as Canada, this represents a remarkable collective effort.

Many event organizers interpreted the theme in their own unique ways by presenting a range of arts and well-being events during the Culture Days weekend.

Some big changes took place for the organization this year including the launch of a new website and a fresh rebrand. We are delighted with the results, and the feedback we have received from the Culture Days community has been overwhelmingly positive. With the new website and look providing a solid foundation, we are ready for some exciting transformations.

In March 2019, the Canada Council for the Arts confirmed a three-year Digital Strategy Fund grant for Culture Days in the 'Transformation of Organizational Models' stream. In the first year of this project, Culture Days will be consulting widely with community and event organizers and evaluating how our platform can better serve the arts and culture sector as a whole.

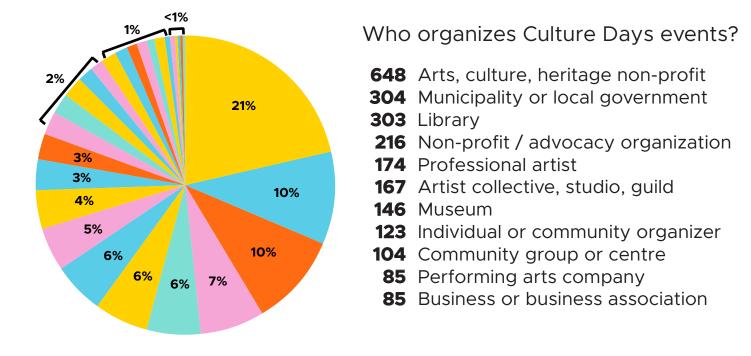

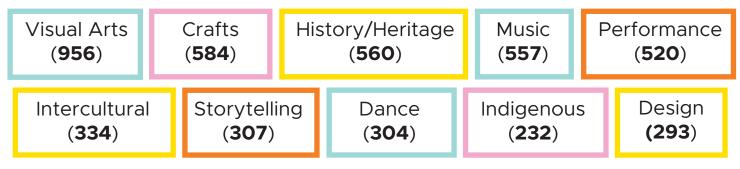

Culture Days' Communications Manager, Shannon Bowler, and creative partner BT/A led a collaborative brand evaluation with provincial partners, and the updated look was launched in the spring. Culture Days organizers embraced the new logo and took inspiration in creating their own local promotional materials.

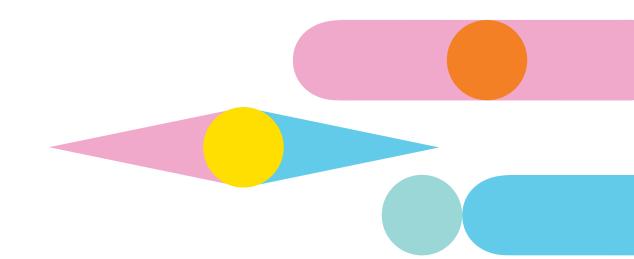


#### Fresh look, new website



Topping the network's wish list was a full-scale redesign of the website. The new system needed to be sharp and beautiful—while also being easy for organizers to register events, and fun for the public to search for activities.

Culture Days' web developer, Jacob Baker-Kretzmar, began designing an entirely new website from the ground up in late 2018. The basic site launched in the spring, and registration soon followed. Improvements and new features were added over the summer including *Culture Days Hubs* and *My Collections*, a custom multi-use itinerary and promotional tool. With the new website as a solid foundation, Culture Days is now ready to expand further into improving discoverability and offering useful new web functions.

#### **Annual theme**

#### Creativity, the Arts, and Well-being

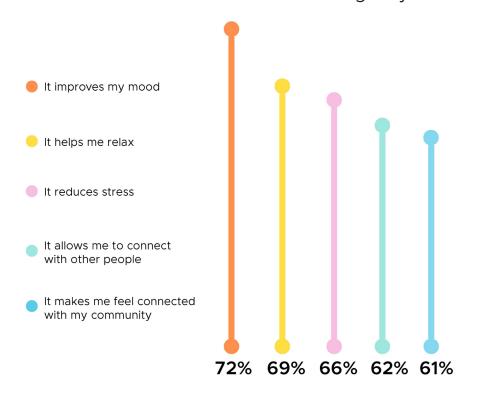
The 2019 theme examined how participating in arts and culture contribute to both individual and collective well-being. Events that took place over the 10th annual Culture Days weekend highlighted the importance of creative expression and how arts and culture benefit the public good.

Each year, Culture Days and research partner Maru/Matchbox survey both the general population and attendees to gain insights related to the annual theme. The results inform year-round initiatives, jumpstart online conversation, and inspire organizers' program planning.

#### Creativity, the Arts, and Well-being series

Prior to the weekend, Culture Days commissioned a special series by Canadian Art Magazine's Leah Sandals. The four posts were packed full of inspiring initiatives that highlight the growing links between the arts, physical and mental health, aging, and the health risks of being an artist.

#### Marketing campaign

Culture Days' national media partners at Pattison, Cineplex, and CBC boost the profile of the weekend, encouraging Canadians to get out and participate. As a result, the Culture Days marketing campaign is valued at over **\$1.8 million** and delivers north of **250 million impressions**.

Promotions are complemented by the independent initiatives of organizers, many of whom tap in to the larger campaign by customizing marketing templates and coordinating on advertising. This strategy amplifies the national messaging at the grassroots level, creating a multi-tiered campaign reaching millions of Canadians.









30 and 15-second ads ran across Cineplex screens, CBC Television, and Pattison's digital network during the month of September. Culture Days graced the back cover of Cineplex Magazine in the lead up.

With Pattison's support, exterior and interior ads ran on subways, streetcars, and buses on eight major transit systems including those in Edmonton, Calgary, Regina, Winnipeg, and Toronto. Digital ads also ran on Pattison residential, office, and airport networks.



#### Media coverage

Culture Days works with Mercedes Findlay Consulting to promote the weekend and engage the public, with provincial partners collaborating to boost events regionally. This collective approach achieves thousands of media hits leading up to the weekend and garners over **13 million media impressions**.

Culture Days is active beyond the weekend on social media platforms, linking creators and inspiring audiences across a vast national digital network.

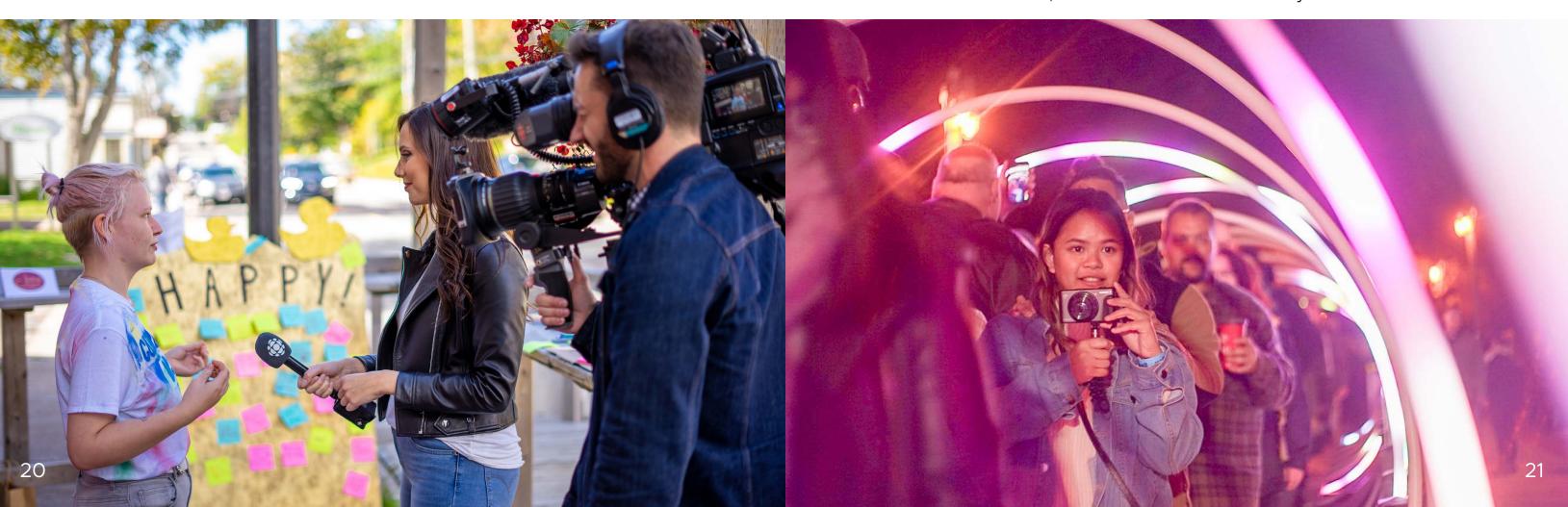

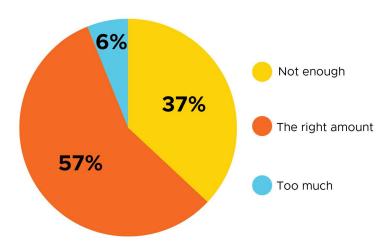
#### **Measuring impacts**

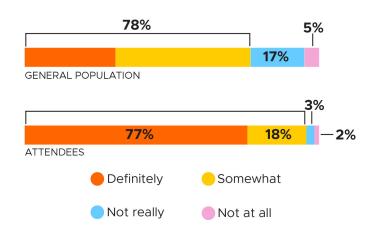
**69%** of Canadians and **98%** of Culture Days attendees have participated in at least one arts and culture activity in the last year. The top five are:



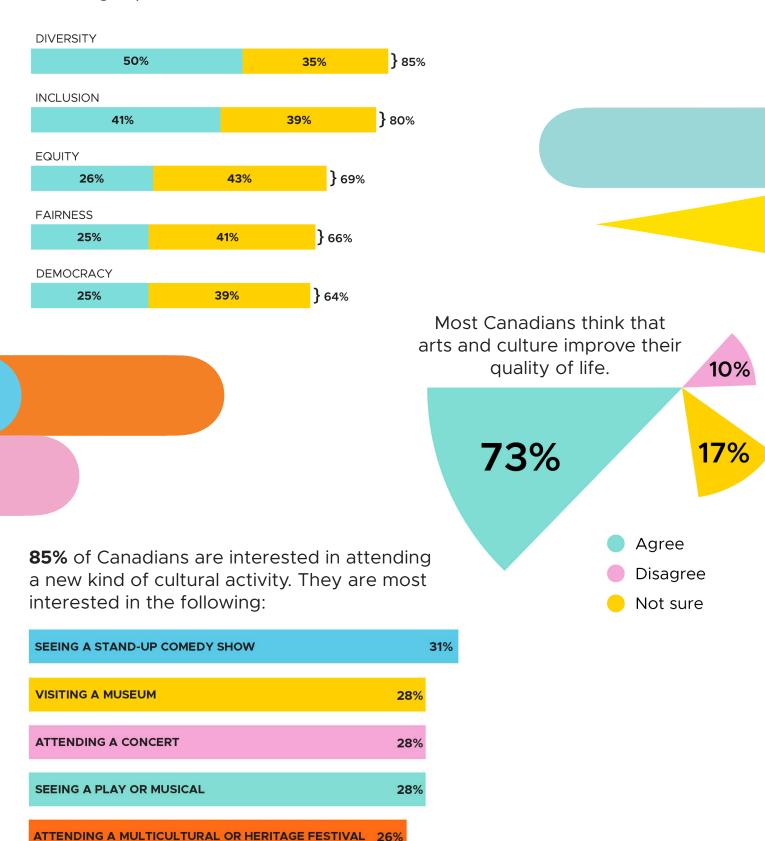
How much arts and culture education do Canadians perceive their children are receiving at school?
